Neighborhood Pop-ups

What is a Pop-ups? It is a low-key, informal gathering among neighbors and residents of nearby blocks. It is an opportunity for neighbors to connect and build relationships while also bringing attention to, or organizing around, issues and collaborating on projects.

Who might attend? Anyone who lives or works on the block or nearby neighborhood. This might include business owners, public safety personnel such as OPD and OFD, community organizations and City employees, such as Neighborhood Services, whose jurisdiction is specifically the block or neighborhood. These are intimate gatherings that are hyper-local.

What is the format? It is relaxed! It can be an opportunity for folks to share some food or drinks, connect and talk. It may be attended by NSCs, OPD, CROs or OFD personnel who mix with the group and have 1:1 conversations. It also might include a Collaborative Neighborhood Gathering (CoNeeG) where neighbors come together, and those who are interested, give stuff, get stuff and meet others.

What is the purpose? Building a tight-knit neighborhood and developing stronger relationships among neighbors and community members! Attendees should feel comfortable and open to share things about themselves such as personal interests or passions. Attendees should also be encouraged to discuss ideas on how to collaborate on projects and impact issues.

What is the desired outcome? Closer relationships, a better understanding of issues or constraints and the start of increased neighborhood collaboration and connection.

Subject: Monthly report from NSD

Successful Community Partnership

- In Beat 31YZ, NC Leaders successfully engaged with the City and CALTRANS to get the area around the pedestrian path between the 880 N on ramp & 98th Avenue cleaned up. Residents expressed how nice it was to see it cleaned on their way to work. In addition, the overhead street lights have even been fixed! This has been months in the making.
- In Beat 27X, Belvedere Neighbors had their second “Call to action meeting.” Chief Armstrong and his team met with neighbors at the Melrose library to discuss ongoing collaboration efforts.
- In 31YZ, the Black Cultural Zone has partnered with this Neighborhood Council (NC) on several outreach efforts providing important information and continues to build support and presence within the four neighborhoods that encompass the community policing beat.
- Outreach was completed with the Chinatown liaison to pass out safety tips for Lunar New Year.
- In Beat 10X, coordinating an active shooter presentation for NC members.
- The 4X NC is having a meeting with the 17th Street merchants, Officers Romero & Sena along with Assistant District Attorney Terry Wiley in February.
- In Beat 2Y/5Y working on bicycle training.
- In 6X, Hoover-Durant helping the Brockhurst Neighbors to facilitate “Coffee with a Cop” in their community.

- In 35X, the NC's ongoing partnership work with local community-based organizations enabled the Oakland Fire Department's Emergency Services Division to begin a process that will bring increased COVID testing and vaccine services to East Oakland.

Beats with challenging projects

- Beat 19X is still having ongoing prostitution issues. Working with different departments to address their concerns.
- In 8X, Adams Point had a meeting with Chief Armstrong around St. Paul's Tower. The residents feel unsafe coming out of their building and walking down the street.
- In Beat 29, the NC, merchants and ABAT are working together to address illegal businesses popping up in the neighborhood.
- In Beat 15, re-establishing the Neighborhood Council. After three successful years of re-engaging strong leadership and community project progress, there is currently a need to rebuild the NC leadership.
- In 35X, the NC is working with an interdepartmental City team to develop traffic calming measures for Crest Avenue near Fontaine with the goal of simultaneously reducing loitering and illegal parking. This is a challenging project due to the cost associated with physical changes to the environment.
- Beat 32Y continues to have concerns around speeding vehicles on the MacArthur Corridor.

Community Priority (Complete or in progress)

- Contacting Neighborhood Watch Block Captains in 8 beats for reactivation. (In progress)
- In beat 18XY/19X the group has started their clean-up and hopes to continue to do it monthly.
- In 32X, the Neighborhood Council is working on addressing litter and illegal dumping. To advance their progress, they held a second monthly clean-up on E Street in partnership with the local OUSD school, a neighboring commercial business, and the office of Councilmember Treva Reid. On January 22nd a group of volunteers facilitated the removal of 20 bags of street litter and miscellaneous debris and created 3 related Oak311 service reports for abandoned autos.

NSD/PST Block Level Update

- Presented an hour-long Safety Presentation via Teams to the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration care. There were roughly 100 participants in attendance.
- Hosted a presentation with residents and management of The Landing Apartments. Where PSTs reviewed CPTED exam findings and presented information about Neighborhood Watch with the hopes that there would be interest among residents to formalize a group.
- Continue to assist Neighborhood Services Coordinators with Neighborhood Council meetings via Zoom.
- Presently working on establishing three Neighborhood Watch groups:
 - 1) 2100 Block of 64th Avenue; 2) 4100 Block of Fruitvale Avenue; & 3) 900 Block of 39th Avenue.

Exciting News

- Neighborhood Services has successfully recruited a new Spanish speaking NSC. She is an experienced city staffer. We will be welcoming her aboard in February.

A quorum of the board was present, Chair Davis made a motion to adopt the above noted Resolution – Resolution passed

2. Neighborhood Council and Community Town Hall

Chair Davis formally introduced Vice Chair Daniel Ettlinger. Thanked Neighborhood Council leaders and community members for attending.

Chair Davis provided an update on the vision for the CPAB. In July, the CPAB voted on a mission statement that focused on two main principles, 1) increasing community engagement and 2) supporting neighborhood empowerment. These two principles are guiding all the efforts and activities that the board is working on going forward. This includes the training that the board received funding of \$25,000 each fiscal year, 2021-22 and 2022-23. Chair Davis acknowledge that Neighborhood Services Division (NSD) Acting Supervisors Araina Richards and Judith Christopher have joined the ad-hoc committee that consists of board members Dalke, Wyatt, and Lerma.

The ad-hoc committee developed a list of training topics that have been shared with Neighborhood Council leaders and community members.

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Chair Davis invited Neighborhood Council and community to provide their input on the following training topics via the survey that was distributed to Neighborhood Councils.

3. Open Forum

Ms. Warren asked about the proposed training session on Alternatives to 911 as it relates to MACRO. Chair Davis explained that the purpose of the session was to provide an in-depth training on the resources available in the community and when is the appropriate time to call 911.

Mr. Ubell expressed concern about the proposed mediation and conflict resolution session and suggested discussing the types of conflicts community members should try and resolve.

Ms. Stage explained that she thought all the topics on the survey are important. She was particularly interested in outreach coupled with equity and diversity as it relates to the census data. Her Neighborhood Council is focused this year on increasing both ethnic and racial diversity, in addition to encouraging participation of community members of various ages and family structures.

Vice Chair Ettliger thanked the attendees for making some great points. He discussed conflict resolution and when to engage. Encouraged the Board to be mindful about what exactly attendees will get out of the trainings.

Ms. Zilliac had a comment about inclusiveness across the board. She raised a concern about getting a lot of homeowners to participate in Neighborhood Councils and the need to encourage residents from apartments to participate.

Chair Davis encouraged attendees to continue submitting feedback on the training topics.

4. NSC Report (presented before OPD Report)

Director DeVries began his presenting by acknowledging the passing of Supervisor Wilma Chan.

Director DeVries provided an overview of the Neighborhood Services Division (NSD) current NSC staffing levels that were submitted in the agenda packet. He updated the board on recent staffing changes and stated that two NSD staff members were recently promoted and others were promoted. As a result, NSD is severely understaffed. He indicated that NSD will recruit for the supervisor and NSC vacancies. Director DeVries made changes in NSC community policing beat assignments using an equity lens.

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Director DeVries indicated that what's notable is the NSC assignments have now shifted to the areas of Oakland that have faced some of the greatest challenges. This includes neighborhoods along the International Corridor. These challenges include high crime rates, high rates of poverty, large high school dropouts and high rates of covid. Feedback for this approach has been generally supportive.

Questions from the Board:

Board member Dalke asked a question about the beats above 580 that continue to need support.

Board Member Ettlinger asked about hiring. He mentioned the amount of time to hire a Cantonese speaker and what information about how to fast track hiring. He also wanted information about how the current level of staffing will affect NEST.

Board Member Wong asked will Neighborhood Councils continue to meet if they don't have an NSC assigned. Director DeVries indicated that they will receive support from NSCs, as needed.

Public Speaker: Ms. Forte commented on the new NSC assignments and concerns about service delivery. Encouraged that hiring to take place from the Oakland community.

Mr. Uriate raised concerns about service delivery and silos in the City of Oakland. Director DeVries explained that his goal as Director of Interdepartmental Operations is to breakdown those silos and with the NSCs being in the City Administrators Office it is the goal to have them continue to problem solve cross departmentally.

Ms. Gilmore updated the board and community on the new staff member to MACRO, Mr Elliott Jones. She also advised that the City Council approved an additional police academy.

Comments

Beat 30Y NCPC, Ms. Rakeisha (spelling?) completed the survey and expressed the need to engage our youth, in particular through schools, starting in elementary school.

Board Member Blacksher agreed with the idea of involving young people.
